theme for this enjoyable Sunday morning coffee concert. It starts with Stravinsky's Suite Italienne, a spin-off from his ballet music Pulcinella that gives Baroque music a new lease of life. He and Nadia Boulanger formed a warm friendship over 50 years (as their recently published letters testify), but her influence spread far and wide as a famed teacher, with pupils including Aaron Copland, Daniel Barenboim and Quincy Jones. Three Pieces begin in melancholic mood, opening into a work full of rich and sonorous melodies. Britten's demanding Cello Sonata is also a work of friendship - written for the legendary cellist Mstislav Rostropovich, and there's a new commission from the distinguished British composer and viola player Sally Beamish.

Benjamin Kruithof hails from Luxemburg and, with major victories including the 2022 George Enescu International competition and a host of concerto appearances with European orchestras, it's hardly surprising he has been recognised as "a name to watch" by Bachtrack and selected as a Rising Star by ECHO.

Rising Stars are nominated by the artistic directors of Europe's most prestigious venues which are members of the European Concert Hall Organisation (ECHO).

Established in 1902, the Lviv National Philharmonic Orchestra make their first visit to Birmingham with the American conductor, Theodore Kuchar, whose own roots lie in Ukraine. As Chief Conductor since 2022, they've been flying the flag for Ukrainian music-making with international tours and important collaborative projects in Poland and Germany.

An attention-grabbing snare drum sets the scene for Rossini's cheerful overture. Then the mood changes in Sibelius's Fourth Symphony – which received its UK premiere in Birmingham Town Hall

in 1912 – as chill winds whip through music that's dark and brooding. The internationally-renowned cellist Jiří Bárta joins the orchestra's leader in the Double Concerto that Brahms intended as an olive branch to his estranged friend, the violinist Joseph Joachim. Full of glorious romanticism, this is both intimate chamber music and full-blooded orchestral writing.

Beethoven's Second Symphony ends the concert as it began, with joy and sparkle, a rollicking first movement and a spirited finale.


It's over 30 years since the Yomiuri Nippon Symphony Orchestra of Tokyo last visited Birmingham, so this concert is certain to be a major event. With Principal Conductor Sebastian Weigle, their concert of blockbusters begins with deliciously seductive music from the 1948 ballet by pre-eminent Japanese composer Akira Ifukube (best known for his film scores for the Godzilla series).

"An exhilarating new look at familiar music" is how The Guardian described free-thinking violinist Christian Tetzlaff's latest recording of the Beethoven Violin Concerto. It sees him "flying side-saddle through the Concerto" adds Gramophone, and to a boundary-pushing composer like Beethoven, Tetzlaff would surely be a kindred spirit.


Rachmaninov's Second Symphony has earned its place in the hearts of classical music audiences everywhere. He composed it in secret before hiding the draft away, but it was an instant success at its first performance. Sweeping and indulgent melodies follow one after another in a stream of inspiration, before the exuberant finale brings this glittering symphony to a bombastic climax.

It was with Beethoven's 'Emperor' Concerto that Italian pianist Federico Colli scooped the prestigious Leeds International Piano Competition, proving to be an exciting talent. That was in 2012 and, since then, he's made a name for himself as a highly original and innovative pianist. Expect a spirited and fresh performance from this charismatic musician of a work whose nobility and grandeur never fail to impress.

Brahms also brings electrifying power and drama to his Fourth Symphony, along with much warmth and beauty too. From the lilting opening theme, through the hushed slow movement, to the inventive finale in which he cleverly weaves 30 variations from an eight-note theme of Bach, Brahms holds you enrapt from the first note to the last.

Opening with Weber's highly-charged operatic overture, the master musicians of the Nuremberg Symphony Orchestra have this music coursing through their veins. At the Nuremberg Meistersingerhalle, they welcome around 200,000 people a year to their 100 or so concerts where they focus their expertise on just such cornerstones of the classical-romantic repertoire as this, and much more besides.

The Hungarian Radio Symphony Orchestra celebrated their 80th anniversary in 2023 and appointed Riccardo Frizza as chief conductor in the same season. He leads the orchestra on tour with the captivating pianist Jeneba Kanneh-Mason, a new star of the famous musical family, following in the footsteps of her celebrated elder siblings Isata and Sheku. She's the soloist in Chopin's best-known piano concerto. This was an immediate early career success for the young pianist-composer who poured his heart and soul into the ravishingly beautiful slow movement while all the time dreaming of the woman he couldn't pluck up the courage to speak to.

The Orchestra have long championed the music of Hungarian composers, including Franz Liszt and Zoltán Kodály whose characterful Dances of Galánta are rooted in 19th century Hungarian and nomadic folk dances. And Beethoven's effervescent Seventh Symphony, written in a Bohemian spa town, also dances along with a spring in its step. A favourite with audiences then as now, it is full of rhythmic vitality and joie de vivre, with a fleet-footed scherzo and an energetic finale that propels the music to its jubilant conclusion.

In between, is Gershwin's Jazz Age masterpiece, Rhapsody in Blue. From 16th century composer, prince and assassin Carlo Gesualdo, to the outspoken lesbian and imprisoned suffragette Ethel Smyth, via Dmitri Shostakovich, declared an 'enemy of the people' by Stalin's regime, all have had to answer for their actions or opinions. Quatuor Agate bring together the unique lives of 'outlaw' musicians who not only composed outside the musical norms of their time but also acted on the fringes of societal norms. With costumes, lighting and image projections, this immersive and fascinating Sunday morning concert is introduced by Princess Eleonora d'Este. the second wife of Carlo Gesualdo (he had murdered his first), who narrates the dark legend of her husband.

For authentic performances of Czech music, look no further! The superb musicians of the Prague Symphony Orchestra are steeped in the music of Smetana and Dvořák which they are touring with Petr Altrichter, the orchestra's Chief Conductor since 1991. They're joined by the dazzling Venezuelan pianist Gabriela Montero, a soloist who's always warmly welcomed at Symphony Hall. Prokofiev's most popular Piano Concerto demands just the kind of virtuosic capabilities and sensitive lyrical playing that Montero has in spades.

Smetana's mercurial overture to The Bartered Bride is a high speed showstopper with its skittering pianissimo strings punctuated with rhythmic outbursts. Playing in the viola section at the opera's premiere was a young Antonín Dvořák. He shared Smetana's passion for Czech music and culture, enriching his own music with its folk dance and melodies. Internationally renowned and riding the crest of a wave when he wrote his Seventh Symphony, this is music that's moody and dramatic, with a more carefree slow movement and dance-like scherzo. Dvořák's ambition that it "must be capable of stirring the world" was certainly realised, and for many people this is undoubtedly his greatest symphony.

Schumann was struggling with mental illness in 1854 when he wrote his final work. Known as the 'Ghost Variations'. he was convinced the graceful theme had been dictated to him by the spirits of Schubert and Mendelssohn, forgetting he'd in fact written it himself in his Violin Concerto. Both works were discovered in the 1930s and Patricia Kopatchinskaja is one of those violinists to have recorded the Concerto in recent years. She writes a new work for Sternath for his ECHO Rising Stars tour. Finally, Liszt's sonata, published in 1854 and dedicated to Schumann, is a test for any pianist. Cascades of notes, dark drama, tender melody and fiendish difficulty all combine in a single glorious arc of light and shade.

Pianist Lukas Sternath is no stranger to the stage having travelled the world as a member of the world-famous Vienna Boys' Choir. With Igor Levit as his mentor since 2022, he achieved sensational success at the 71st International ARD Music Competition, winning not only First Prize but seven special prizes including the audience prize too.



The radiant and heart-stopping Adagietto is without doubt the defining movement of Mahler's Fifth – a love token for his beloved new wife, Alma – played by strings and harp alone. But this Symphony is about so much more than that, as the BBC National Orchestra of Wales and award-winning Principal Conductor Ryan Bancroft will testify. In somewhat over an hour of music, Mahler runs the full gamut of emotion from the trumpet fanfare that introduces a dark funeral procession, through what he calls "this primeval music, this foaming, raging sea of sound" to a whirling dance and, after the serenity of the Adagietto, a boisterous and joyful finale.

Like Mahler, Bartók wrote a musical gift for the woman he loved – his First Violin Concerto. But, unlike Mahler, Bartók's was rejected (as was he shortly afterwards) and the work remained unpublished until long after his death. James Ehnes, "the Jascha Heifetz of our day" (The Globe and Mail, Canada) is a champion of this two-movement Concerto, and the perfect interpreter to bring out both the romance and tetchiness of Bartók's intensely personal work.

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
